Environmental Concerns Committee:

Fellow OK Chapter Members,

Hello from the Environmental Concerns Committee, I hope this finds you well. An area of concern we have been exploring has been hydraulic fracturing “fracking” and it’s potential impacts to our aquatic resources. During this time of research we discovered a draft policy statement by our parent society titled *Mining and Fossil Fuel Extraction*. The draft has since been accepted and placed on the AFS website as a policy statement. While broad in scope it is still very applicable to our state. Since this valuable resource is no longer just a draft version and is more comprehensive in addressing concerns related to exploration than our draft, I would like to place a hyperlink on our OKAFS website and adopt it as our stance. In the effort to make this more local in scale, I will attach the Appendix of Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) potentially affected, created for our original document, along with a call to action for OKAFS members, fisheries professionals and all Oklahomans.

As always I ask you to contact me or the other members of this committee with any environmental concerns that you have. Local matters in which we can make a difference and make our voices heard are of the utmost importance and can have the greatest impacts. Thank you and see you in 2017.

C. Needed Action

OKAFS understands Oklahoma's rich history in oil and gas production and supports its economic contribution to the state; however, with such a history comes the burden of legacy, which can make it hard to create regulations or adapt old policies to solve new problems. This chapter would like policies introduced to reduce the overall negative impacts of exploration and production efforts such as:

- Phasing out of wastewater pits which are prone to leaking, flooding and breaching
- Incentives to increase recycling of frac-fluid or promote new technologies that reduce water consumption
- Reduction of the reportable land spill threshold from 10 barrels to 5
- Required testing of surface and subsurface water quality before a well is placed
- Tighter water permitting restrictions and regulatory oversight
- Implementation of sediment control BMP's

In addition to changes in regulations OKAFS calls for fisheries professionals to identify and fill vital research gaps in how our native aquatic species are affected by fracking related exploration. As leaders in the oil and gas industry, Oklahoma should strive to be on the forefront of responsible exploration policies and environmental research related to its impacts, specifically to the surface water and groundwater resources on which our fisheries are based.

Internship Opportunity at the Paddlefish Research Center

The Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation has established an Internship Program to help students that are majoring in wildlife related fields to gain work experience. The Department has a limited number of internship positions available. Positions are seasonal and vary by location and duration.

Internships are primarily in the spring and summer, with occasional fall positions. Locations are state-wide. Work schedules will be determined by the supervisor. Positions will be limited to 2 terms not to exceed 975 hours per term. (a term is a 12-month period starting with the hire date). A 3rd term may be worked only if the Intern is continuing their education. Verification must be submitted, if rehired for a 3rd term. Lodging is not provided.

Intern applicants must be actively pursuing a degree, or have obtained a degree, in the following college majors:

- Wildlife Conservation Science
- Wildlife Ecology Education
- Biology Communications
- Zoology
- Other related wildlife degrees

Graduate degree candidates, seniors, juniors, and sophomores with majors in wildlife conservation and those with previous related work experience in fisheries or wildlife will receive preference.
